The sentences below include 30 of the fixed compound words that you would find in most major dictionaries. In each sentence, highlight all of the fixed compound words you can find.

Hint: Some common <u>noun phrases</u> can look like open compound words. If you remove part of a compound word, it doesn't have the same meaning (e.g., "ice" and "cream" in "ice cream"). If you remove part of a noun phrase, it still has the same meaning.
